I. Call to Order - Brian J. Felcoski, Chair

Brian called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

II. <u>Attendance</u> - Debra L. Boje, Secretary

The attendance roster was circulated to be initialed by Council members in attendance at the meeting. Attendance is shown cumulatively on circulated attendance rosters. Debbie reminded the Council members that it is the responsibility of each member to record his or her own attendance on the roster and to promptly bring any corrections to the attention of the Secretary. The cumulative attendance roster to date for the 2010-2011 Bar year is attached to these Minutes as **Exhibit A**.

III. Minutes of Previous Meeting - Debra L. Boje, Secretary

The Minutes of the Executive Council Meeting held in Orlando, Florida on September 25, 2010, included at pages 12-26 of the agenda materials were corrected to reflect the attendance of Laird Lile, Fred Jones and Patricia P. Jones. In all other respects, the minutes were approved without change.

IV. Chair's Report - Brian J. Felcoski, Chair

1. Brian welcomed all in attendance. Brian reviewed the day's activities and the remaining dates and locations of the Executive Council meetings for 2010-2011, appearing on page 65 of the agenda materials. Brian advised those attending the meeting in Santa Barbara that the event sign-up sheet would be coming out soon and that it was important to sign up early as some events are limited.

Brian announced that a new Ad Hoc Committee was being formed to be known as the Foreclosure Reform Ad Hoc Committee. The purpose of this committee will be to draft legislation to improve foreclosure procedures and to advise the Section and provide a resource to the Legislature (if requested) on issues relating to the foreclosure moratoria announced by many of the residential mortgage lenders and servicers.

- 3. Brian advised members that Mike Dribin will not be able to be in attendance at today's meeting because his father had a stroke last night and he had to return home. Brian asked members to keep Mike Dribin's father in their thoughts and prayers.
- 4. Brian advised that Thomas P. Evans had passed away on October 27, 2010. Tom was Chairman of Section's Practice Steering Committee from 1964-1966. Brian asked that we keep Tom's family in our thoughts and prayers.
- 5. Brian advised that Gwynne Young has announced her candidacy for Florida Bar President. Brian asked Gwynne to stand up and be recognized. Gwynne thanked Section members for its tremendous support. She expressed her appreciation to all.
- 6. Brian thanked the Florida Bar Foundation, US Trust, and Stewart Title for their co-sponsorship of the Executive Council luncheon. Representatives from each company where invited to the podium to provide brief remarks.
- 7. Tim Bachmeyer, Director of Development, for the Florida Bar Foundation thanked the Section for its donation from the sales of its commemorative cookbooks in recognition of Liz Smith. Sandy Diamond advised that the final donation was anticipated to be \$1300.

V. <u>Chair-Elect's Report</u> – George J. Meyer, Chair-Elect

IX. <u>Probate and Trust Law Division</u> – Wm. Fletcher Belcher, Probate and Trust Law Division

Information Items

- 1. Laird A. Lile, as Liaison to the Clerks of the Circuit Court, reported on the duties imposed upon attorneys by new Florida Rule of Judicial Administration 2.420(d) (effective 10-1-10). The new rule puts an affirmative duty on attorneys to identify confidential information contained in papers filed in a Florida court. A supplemental handout was provided, which is attached to these minutes as **Exhibit C**.
- 2. Fletch reviewed the Proposed Advisory Opinion 10-03 (9-24-10) appearing at pages 78-82 of the agenda materials from the Professional Ethics Committee of The Florida Bar, on the issue of ethical obligations of an attorney when a personal representative, beneficiaries, or heirs-at-law of a decedent, or their attorney, request confidential information. Fletch advised that the Section did review the Opinion and participated in the discussions that took place in the drafting of the Opinion. The deadline for providing comments to the Opinion is November 15, 2010. Fletch thanked Barry for his past contributions and summaries of the topic that were used as a template of the Opinion.
- 3. Fletch reported on the status of the work of the Ad Hoc Committee on Creditors' Rights to Non-Exempt, Non-Probate Assets. Based upon a straw vote taken at the Probate Roundtable, the Committee is going to continue its efforts.

Action Items

1. IRA, Insurance & Employee Benefits Committee – Linda Suzzanne Griffin and L. Howard Payne, Co-Chairs

On behalf of the committee Linda presented proposed legislation to further clarify that an inherited IRA account, as defined in s. 408(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, is a fund or account exempt from claims of creditors of the owner, beneficiary, or participant. The statutory wording, a White Paper, and Legislative Request appears at pages 83-91 of the agenda materials. A handout was circulated that modified the statutory wording. The handout containing the modified statutory wording is attached to these minutes as **Exhibit D**. The Committee's motion to approve the proposed legislation, as modified, in the supplemental materials was approved. The Committee's motions to find such action to be within the purview of the Section and to authorize the expenditure of Section funds in support of that position were also unanimously approved.

2. Probate & Trust Litigation Committee – William T. Hennessey III, Chair

On behalf of the Committee, Bill presented proposed legislation to clarify that revocation of a will or trust is subject to challenge on the grounds of fraud, duress, mistake or undue influence after the death of the testator or settler the same as the creation of a will or trust is subject to challenge. The statutory wording, a White Paper, and Legislative Request appears at pages 92 - 102 of the agenda materials. Bill circulated a supplement to the material that added revisions to Section 744.441. A copy of the supplement is attached to these minutes as **Exhibit E**. Chip Waller moved that the Committee's motion be amended to remove the revisions to Section 744.411. The motion to amend was seconded. explained the guardianship committee's concerns as to why the revision to Section 744.441 was necessary to prevent a flood of pre-death will contests at the cost of a Ward. The motion to amend the Committee's motion failed. The Committee's motion to approve the proposed legislation, including revisions to section 744.441, was unanimously approved. The Committee's motion to find such action to be within the purview of the Section and to authorize the expenditure of Section funds in support of that position also were unanimously approved.

3. Probate Law & Procedure Committee – Tae Kelley Bronner, Chair

On behalf of the Committee, Tae presented proposed legislation to clarify and provide additional guidance with respect to a decedent's right to control the disposition of his or her remains and, absent specific directions from a decedent, determining the person who is legally authorized to make decisions regarding the place and manner of disposition of a decedent's remains. The statutory wording, a White Paper, and Legislative Request appears at pages 103-120 of the agenda materials. Tae provided a brief explanation of the history of the proposed legislation. The Committee's motion to approve the proposed legislation was unanimously approved. The Committee's motion to find such action to be within the purview of the Section and to authorize the expenditure of Section funds in support of that position also were unanimously approved.

4. **Probate Law & Procedure Committee** – Tae Kelley Bronner, Chair

On behalf of the Committee, Tae presented proposed legislation that permits judicial reformation and modification of wills, and provides for an award of taxable fees and costs, including attorneys fees and guardian ad litem fees, in such actions. The statutory wording, a White Paper, and Legislative Request appears at pages 121-135 of the agenda materials. The Committee's motion to approve the proposed legislation was unanimously approved. The Committee's motion to find such action to be within the purview of the Section and to authorize the expenditure of Section funds in support of that position also were unanimously approved.

X. <u>Real Property Division</u> — Margaret A. Rolando, Real Property Division Director

Information Items

1. Private Transfer Fee Covenants. Peggy reminded members that as previously reported, on August 16th, the Federal Housing Finance Agency (FHFA) issued a proposed "Guidance on Private Transfer Fee Covenants" to the Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae), the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (Freddie Mac) and the Federal Home Loan Banks which would effectively prohibit them from dealing with mortgages on properties encumbered by private transfer fee covenants. The proposed Guidelines would prohibit Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac from purchasing or investing in any mortgages on property encumbered by private transfer fee covenants, and would prohibit the banks from purchasing or investing in any such mortgages or holding such mortgages as collateral.

Peggy advised that the Section had drafted and successfully lobbied for the passage of Section 689.28 in 2008, which prohibits private transfer fee covenants, but makes exceptions for transfer fees paid to condominium associations, homeowner's associations, and nonprofit or charitable organizations for the purpose of supporting cultural, educational, charitable, recreational, environmental, conservation, or other similar activities benefiting the community subject to the covenant. Unlike Section 689.28, which was prospective in application, the FHFA Guidelines would apply to existing transfer fees and likely would have a substantial negative impact on sales of new and existing homes and condominium units subject to "good" transfer fees because lenders will not provide mortgages on property in communities with these covenants when the loans cannot be sold into the secondary market controlled by Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac.

Peggy advised that the Condominium and Planned Development Committee and Real Estate Problem Study Committee prepared a letter on behalf of the Section, which commented on the proposed Guidelines and recommended Section 689.28, as an example of an effective, balanced approach. A copy of the letter of the letter appears at page 173-178 of the agenda materials. The Committee on an emergency basis recommended that the letter be submitted to the FHFA. The Executive Committee approved the sending of the letter on behalf of the Section.

Pat reported, on behalf of the Committee, on the proposed revisions to the standards in Chapter 17 of the Uniform Title Standards – Marketable Record Title Act, appearing at pages 136-164 of the agenda materials.

The Committee's motion to approve the changes to the title standards in Chapter 17, as reflected in the agenda materials at pages 136-164, was unanimously approved.

2. Condominium and Planned Development Committee – Robert S. Freedman, Chair

On behalf of the Committee, Rob presented proposed legislation to amend Section 718.117, to accommodate partial terminations of condominiums more effectively and to clarify certain ambiguities in the current statute posed by partial terminations. The statutory wording, a White Paper, and

Legislative Request appears at pages 165-172 of the agenda materials. The Committee's motion to approve the proposed legislation was unanimously approved. The Committee's motion to find such action to be within the purview of the Section and to authorize the expenditure of Section funds in support of that position also were unanimously approved.

3. Land Trust Committee – Susan Katherine Frazier, Chair

Peggy announced that this item was being deferred.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS REPORT

Dan DeCubellis, Board Liaison

At its October 1 meeting, The Florida Bar Board of Governors:

ELECTRONIC SERVICE OF CASE DOCUMENTS

Recommended approval of Rule of Judicial Administration 2.516, dealing with electronic service of case documents. The rule will be filed in the supreme court and there will be a comment period. It will be posted on The Florida Bar's website when the petition is filed.

REDACTION OF COURT FILINGS

Received a report on the New Rule 2.420 Seminar. It was the most downloaded/accessed program on LegalSpan in September. It explains the new rule on what information must be redacted in court filings as of October 1, 2010.

DIVERSITY

Discussed ways to continue to promote diversity in the profession beyond the Bar's new program to encourage local bars to pursue diversity. President Mayanne Downs and President-elect Scott Hawkins said they have talked with sections and committees about bringing in younger and diverse lawyers.

WITNESS FEES

Approved an amendment to Rule 4-3.4, which would allow paying a reasonable fee for someone who is retired for being a witness in a case.

BAR CAMPAIGNING

Voted to temporarily suspend Standing Board Policy 2.20 on campaigning for presidentelect pending later confirmation of qualified candidates and further review of the ground rules for these elections.

BYLAWS

Heard that the Rules Committee is considering an amendment eliminating Bylaw 2-5.2, which allows any Bar member to propose a resolution to be considered at the General Assembly of the Bar's Annual Convention.

BUDGET

Heard a report from the budget committee that the unaudited financial statements for the Bar's fiscal year reflected improvements due in part to fiscally conservative actions by Bar management.

ECONOMY

Heard that in addition to its other efforts, the Program Evaluation Committee is studying what the Bar can do to help members hard hit by the current economic recession.

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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to individual retirement accounts amending s. 222.21(2)(c), Florida Statutes; clarifying the exemption of inherited individual retirement accounts from legal processes; providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, many residents of Florida have individual retirement accounts, relying upon the Legislature's intent that individual retirement accounts are intended to be exempt from claims of creditors:

WHEREAS, the Legislature clearly intended in s. 222.21(c), Florida Statutes, that inherited individual retirement accounts included in s. 402(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, be exempt from claims of creditors of the owner, beneficiary, or participant of the inherited individual retirement account:

WHEREAS, in Robertson v. Deeb, 16 So. 3d 936 (Fla. 2D DCA 2009) the appellate court, contrary to the Legislature's intent, held that an inherited individual retirement account was not exempt from the beneficiaries' creditors because such an account was not included in property described in s. 222.21, Florida Statutes, a decision that was followed in In re Ann S. Ard, 2010 WL 3400368 the Bankruptcy Court of the Middle District of Florida.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Paragraph (c) of subsection (2) of s. 222.21, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

222.21. Exemption of pension money and certain tax-exempt funds or accounts from legal processes

(c) Any money, er other assets or any interest in any fund or account that is are exempt from claims of creditors of the owner, beneficiary, or participant under paragraph (a) does not cease to be exemptionafter the owner's death by reason of a direct transfer or eligible rollover that is excluded from gross income under s. 402(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, including, but not limited to, a direct transfer or eligible rollover to an inherited individual retirement account as defined in s. 408(d)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming law.

Section 3. These amendments to paragraph (c) of subsection (2) of s. 222.21, Florida Statutes, are intended to clarify existing law, are remedial in nature, and shall have retroactive application to all inherited individual retirement accounts without regard to the date they were created.


744.441. Powers of guardian upon court approval

After obtaining approval of the court pursuant to a petition for authorization to act, a plenary guardian of the property, or a limited guardian of the property within the powers granted by the order appointing the guardian or an approved annual or amended guardianship report, may:

...

(11) Prosecute or defend claims or proceedings in any jurisdiction for the protection of the estate and of the guardian in the performance of his or her duties. Before authorizing a guardian to bring an action described in s. 736.0207, the court shall first find that the action appears to be in the ward's best interests during the ward's probable lifetime. An action to prosecute or defend a claim of the ward's improper revocation of all or part of a trust in which the issues relate solely to a devise is not in the ward's best interests during the ward's probable lifetime. Nothing in this subsection shall preclude a challenge after the ward's death. If the court denies a request that a guardian be authorized to bring an action described in s. 736.0207, the court shall review the continued need for a guardian and the extent of the need for delegation of the ward's rights.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS REPORT

Dan DeCubellis, Board Liaison

At its December 10 meeting at Amelia Island, The Florida Bar Board of Governors:

RPPTL SECTION ITEMS:

1. LEGISLATIVE POSITIONS

The board approved the following new requested legislative positions of the Section:

- (a) Distressed Condominium Act—Bulk Buyers
- (b) Homeowners Association Act—Communications & Internet
- (c) Notices of Judicial Sales—Expanded Publication by Internet
- (d) Uniform Power of Attorney Act with Florida Modifications
- (e) Intestate Estates—Surviving Spouse Share
- (f) Trust Proceedings—Attorneys Fees and Costs
- (g) Construction Liens on Leased Premises
- (h) Inherited IRA Accounts—Exemption
- (i) Wills—Modification and Reformation
- (j) Wills & Trusts--Revocation

The board referred decision to the Executive Committee on requested legislative positions from the Real Property, Probate and Trust Law Section and the Business Law Section on potential legislation addressing the Florida Supreme Court's recent Olmstead decision affecting limited liability companies. Decision will be made by the Executive Committee after January 18, 2011 to allow the Trial Lawyers Section, the Family Law Section, and possible other groups to review and comment on the issue.

2. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION OF DECEASED CLIENT

Proposed Advisory Opinion 10-3 addresses disclosing confidential information of a decedent at the request of a personal representative, beneficiaries, heirs of the decedent's estate, or their counsel. Comments were received on this opinion, so it will go back to the professional ethics committee at its next meeting.

OTHER ITEMS:

PROBATE RULES COMMITTEE

The board approved the filing of 2010 out of cycle rule amendments as requested by the Florida Probate Rules Committee resulting from the 2010 legislative session. The rule amendments relate to rules 5.201; 5.260; 5.360 and the creation of rules 5.3425 and 5.4055.

FRAUD IN FORECLOSURE CASES

President Mayanne Downs reported about the activities of the Florida Bar to combat fraud in foreclosure cases. Among other things, President Mayanne Downs has written to the chief judge of each of Florida's judicial circuits asking that all judges copy The Florida Bar with any Order that finds members have conducted themselves contrary to bar rules.

APPROVAL OF LEGISLATIVE POSITIONS

Approved on the recommendation of the Legislation Committee, a reauthorization of 13 legislative positions from the 2008-10 biennium for the 2010-12 biennium.

NEW COMMITTEE TO STUDY LAWYER REFERRAL SERVICES

At the suggestion of President Mayanne Downs and the Program Evaluation Committee, the board approved the creation of a new special committee to study the regulation of lawyer referral services.

FORMS AND SOFTWARE TO MEET BAR TRUST ACCOUNTING RULES

Heard from Clients' Security Fund Procedure Committee Chair Greg Coleman that the committee is working with the Disciplinary Procedure Committee on developing forms and software to help attorneys meet Bar trust account regulations. Disciplinary Procedure Committee Chair Andy Sasso said the forms and software could reduce costs of the Bar's grievance operations by reducing the number of cases prosecuted because of inadvertent errors on handing trust accounts. The Disciplinary Procedure Committee is also looking at requiring lawyers to fill out the trust account compliance statement on annual fee statements, with those who fail being considered delinquent members.

ADVISORY OPINION ON CONTACT WITH GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES

Approved, on the recommendation of the Board Review Committee on Professional Ethics, a modified Proposed Advisory Opinion 09-1 on contacting government employees when they are represented by counsel. The Bar's website contains the proposed advisory opinions and the adopted opinions in the Professional Practice section and Ethics Opinions subsection.

CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION ON COMPUTERS AND PRINTERS

Proposed Advisory Opinion 10-2 regarding confidential information stored on hard drives of scanners, printers and other computer-related equipment advises that lawyers must take reasonable steps to preserve confidential client information that may be captured and stored on hard drives of scanners, printers, and other computer-related equipment when that equipment is sold or disposed. The board received no comments and this opinion is final.

STRATEGIC PLAN

Heard a report on the Bar's updated strategic plan from President-elect Scott Hawkins. Bar goals remain protecting the judicial branch and its funding, building public confidence in the profession and the legal system, ensuring access to the courts and legal services, and enhancing the value of a Bar membership for lawyers.

DIVERSITY GRANT PROGRAM

Approved a \$50,000 budget amendment for the Bar's diversity grant program. Dori Foster-Morales and Arnell Bryant-Willis, co-chairs of the Special Committee on Diversity, asked board members to help get the word out to local bars that the money is available to support initiatives and programs which encourage diversity, diversity training and dialogue among lawyers in Florida through financial support of conferences, seminars, summits and symposia planned and hosted by local and specialty bar associations. The first deadline for grant applications is January 18.

PROGRAM REVIEWS

Heard a report from Program Evaluation Committee Chair Greg Coleman that the committee is continuing with its review of the Bar's professionalism and registered paralegal programs.

LEGISLATIVE SESSION AND ANTI-JUDGE POLITICAL CAMPAIGNS

Heard Steve Metz, the Bar's chief legislative counsel, discuss the upcoming session. Metz warned there are many uncertainties, including a larger than expected budget deficit, a new governor, and criticisms by some legislative leaders of recent Supreme Court rulings. He also warned of a trend by business and other outside interests mounting expensive and last minute campaigns against appellate judges up for merit retention and said that could happen in Florida in 2012.

2009-10 AUDIT

Audit Committee Chair Eric Meeks presented the audit for the 2009-10 fiscal year performed by the certified public accounting firm of Carr, Riggs & Ingram, LLC, and he reported that the Bar had a clean audit.

INVESTMENTS

Heard Investment Committee Chair Ian Comisky report that Bar investments are at an all-time high and have completely recovered from the 2008 market decline. He said the investment committee is slightly adjusting its short-term fund investments to up the percentage in the bond market to get higher returns in the current low-interest market. The Bar's long-term fund earned 8.85 percent since the third quarter of 2010, and the new investments in managed futures and hedge funds have performed well and as expected. The board approved the committee's recommendation to replace Henderson International Growth with Harding Loevner as manager for part of the Bar's international fund investments.

LAWYER REGULATION

Heard from former Bar Director of Lawyer Regulation Tony Boggs on the importance of maintaining high standards in the Bar's grievance and admissions processes, and the importance of having a balance in the discipline process that both protects the public and respects individual rights.

Dear Mr. Picker:

In response to your request for comment presented in your December 14, 2010 correspondence to the undersigned, a subcommittee of the pertinent committees within the Real Property, Probate and Trust Law Section ("RPPTL") of the Florida Bar was created to study the issues raised and provide a practical and coherent approach to address the concerns. The subcommittee was comprised of members of the following RPPTL committees: Mortgages and Other Encumbrances Committee, Residential Real Estate & Industry Liaison Committee, Real Property Problems Study Committee and Professionalism and Ethics Committee.

The subcommittee members were real property attorneys from throughout Florida with both positive and negative experiences involving nonlawyers assisting property owners in short sale transactions. The subcommittee members included counsel who represent the nonlawyer categories under consideration by the UPL Committee, namely real estate agents and brokers and mortgage brokers, as well as counsel with years of experience representing property owners in short sale transactions.

The subcommittee members extensively discussed the benefits and detriments of having a nonlawyer participate in a short sale with the property owner's lender(s) and other creditors, with the concern being at what point the nonlawyer crossed the line into the unlicensed practice of law. Based upon the consensus of the subcommittee, the RPPTL Section offers the following guidelines for the UPL Committee's consideration regarding a nonlawyer assisting a property owner in a short sale transaction:

--- A non-lawyer who assists a property owner in performing the following in connection with a short sale transaction is not practicing law: fact finding, information and documentation gathering and transmittal of the information and documentation to the property owner's lender(s) to facilitate the approval of the short sale transaction.

--- A non-lawyer who assists a property owner in performing the following in connection with a short sale transaction is practicing law: evaluating and/or giving an opinion as to the legal significance of any document, including, without limitation, documents submitted by the property owner to the lender or documents from the lender relating to the terms of the short sale approval or deficiency; providing advice regarding the legal ramifications of a short sale (with or without deficiency waiver), foreclosure, bankruptcy or any other legal recourse.

--- A non-lawyer who assists a property owner in negotiating the terms of a short sale approval may or may not be practicing law depending on the particular facts. Generally, if the negotiating involves evaluating, advising or giving a legal opinion, then such negotiating is practicing law. Generally, if the negotiating is simply the transmittal of information from one party to the other without evaluating, advising or opining, then the negotiating is not the practice of law.

Because the unlicensed practice of law can inadvertently or deliberately occur when a nonlawyer assists a property owner in a short sale transaction, the UPL Committee may consider legislation requiring disclosure by any nonlawyer assisting a property owner in processing a short sale transaction. The RPPTL Section appreciates the opportunity to provide the above information to the UPL Committee and remains available to offer further assistance.

PROFESSIONAL ETHICS OF THE FLORIDA BAR

PROPOSED ADVISORY OPINION 10-3 September 24, 2010

 The Professional Ethics Committee has been requested by the Florida Bar Board of Governors to render an advisory opinion on the issue of the ethical obligations of a lawyer when the personal representative, beneficiaries or heirs-at-law of a decedent's estate, or their counsel request confidential information regarding a decedent. The analysis of the issue is the same for each person who may request such information, although the answer for each will depend on the individual facts and circumstances of the particular situation and may differ, depending on who is requesting the information and why.

Although a lawyer's ethical obligation of confidentiality and the evidentiary matter of attorney-client privilege are related, the two issues are distinct. Confidentiality is much broader than privilege. According to Rule 4-1.6, Rules of Professional Conduct, all information relating to a client's representation is confidential and may not be voluntarily disclosed by the lawyer without either the client's consent or the application of a relevant exception to the confidentiality rule. The comment to Rule 4-1.6 provides further guidance, in stating: "[t]he confidentiality rule applies not merely to matters communicated in confidence by the client but also to all information relating to the representation, whatever its source." On the other hand, privilege is much narrower as an evidentiary matter set forth in Florida Statutes § 90.502, which provides generally that a lawyer cannot be compelled to disclose confidential communications between a lawyer and client that were made for the purpose of seeking and/or receiving legal advice without the client's consent or other waiver. over the client's objection. Ouestions of confidentiality arise any time a lawyer is asked to disclose information relating to a client's representation. The question of privilege only arises when a lawyer is compelled by a court, i.e. via subpoena, to disclose confidential communications made for the purpose of obtaining legal advice. Regarding privilege, the comment to Rule 4-1.6 provides as follows:

 If a lawyer is called as a witness to give testimony concerning a client, absent waiver by the client, rule 4-1.6(a) requires the lawyer to invoke the privilege when it is applicable. The lawyer must comply with the final orders of a court or other tribunal of competent jurisdiction requiring the lawyer to give information about the client.

Rule 4-1.6 provides as follows:

 (a) Consent Required to Reveal Information. A lawyer shall not reveal information relating to representation of a client except as stated in subdivisions (b), (c), and (d), unless the client gives informed consent.

(b) When Lawyer Must Reveal Information. A lawyer shall reveal such information to the extent the lawyer reasonably believes necessary:

(1) to prevent a client from committing a crime; or

47 (2) to prevent a death or substantial bodily harm to another. 48 49 50 51 52 53 requires not to be disclosed; 54 55 56 between the lawyer and client: 57 58 59 60 61 62 representation of the client; or 63 64

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- (c) When Lawyer May Reveal Information. A lawyer may reveal such information to the extent the lawyer reasonably believes necessary:
- (1) to serve the client's interest unless it is information the client specifically
- (2) to establish a claim or defense on behalf of the lawyer in a controversy
- (3) to establish a defense to a criminal charge or civil claim against the lawyer based upon conduct in which the client was involved;
- (4) to respond to allegations in any proceeding concerning the lawyer's
 - (5) to comply with the Rules of Professional Conduct.
- (d) Exhaustion of Appellate Remedies. When required by a tribunal to reveal such information, a lawyer may first exhaust all appellate remedies.
- (e) Limitation on Amount of Disclosure. When disclosure is mandated or permitted, the lawyer shall disclose no more information than is required to meet the requirements or accomplish the purposes of this rule.

The comment to the rule states that "[t]he duty of confidentiality continues after the client-lawyer relationship has terminated."

A request for information from a personal representative, beneficiaries or heirs-at-law of a decedent's estate, or their counsel will generally involve information "relating to the representation of a client," and a lawyer ordinarily should not voluntarily disclose such information without the client's informed consent. See Florida Ethics Opinion 92-5. There are exceptions to the confidentiality rule that either require or permit a lawyer to disclose confidential information. The Committee cannot envision every instance in which a personal representative, beneficiaries or heirs-at-law of a decedent's estate, or their counsel may request information from a decedent's lawyer, but will provide several examples in an effort to illustrate the appropriate analysis.

The exception to the confidentiality rule that is most likely to apply in such requests is set forth in subdivision (c)(1): "to serve the client's interest unless it is information the client specifically requires not to be disclosed." Thus, if a personal representative asks for confidential information relating to a decedent's estate plan and the decedent's lawyer determines that disclosure of the information would aid in the proper distribution of the decedent's estate according to the decedent's wishes, the lawyer may properly disclose the information to the personal representative, unless the decedent specifically required that the information be kept confidential. For example, in Florida Ethics Opinion 72-40, a client instructed the inquiring lawyer who was hired to assist the client with estate planning to "forget" that the client had a

"large amount of bearer bonds, registered jointly with his wife." The opinion concludes that the lawyer may not disclose the existence of these assets to the bank which was to be the sole executor of the client's estate unless the client gave consent to the disclosure or unless ordered to do so by a court, whether the inquiry was made before or after the client's death. The opinion states that "the duty to preserve a client's confidences survives his death..." Thus, a lawyer must undertake the appropriate analysis under the confidentiality rule, even if it is the personal representative who requests information of the decedent from a lawyer who assisted in the decedent's estate planning and the information sought relates specifically to that estate plan.

Similarly, if a beneficiary or heir-at-law asks for specific information and the decedent's lawyer determines that voluntary disclosure of the information would serve the decedent's interests, the lawyer may disclose that specific information. For example, a lawyer might provide a copy of the decedent's will or disclose information relating to the execution of a will to a beneficiary or heir-at-law if the lawyer reasonably believes that disclosure of the information would forestall litigation by the beneficiary or heir-at-law, thereby conserving assets of the estate in the exercise of the lawyer's professional discretion. However, information that the decedent specifically required the lawyer not to disclose to others will always remain confidential, will always be subject to the lawyer-client evidentiary privilege, and may not be disclosed by the lawyer to the beneficiary, or heir-at-law, or anyone else, regardless of whether the information is privileged the lawyer thinks disclosure would "serve the client's interest". For example, a deceased client may have specifically instructed the lawyer not to disclose information to anyone about an illegitimate child or an extra-marital relationship.

Under Florida Statutes §90.502(3)(c), the *personal representative* may claim the privilege on behalf of the decedent. It would be difficult for the personal representative to claim or waive privilege on behalf of the decedent without knowing the content of the information which is subject to the privilege. Therefore, a lawyer who represented the decedent in estate planning matters may disclose information from the file to the personal representative, unless the decedent specifically required that the information not be disclosed. Disclosure of such information is impliedly authorized, to the extent the decedent did not specifically require that its confidentiality be maintained, to carry out the decedent's wishes involving the estate.

On the other hand, a lawyer who represented the decedent on matters other than estate planning would have no such implied authorization to disclose information to the personal representative. For example, a lawyer who represented a client in a criminal defense matter would not have implied authorization to disclose <u>confidential</u> information to the personal representative, but instead should decline to voluntarily provide <u>confidential</u> information to the personal representative or other third parties unless a different exception to the confidentiality rule clearly applies.

Similarly, beneficiaries or heirs-at-law may attempt to compel the decedent's lawyer to provide confidential information that the lawyer has determined within the lawyer's professional discretion not to provide voluntarily, because it either would not serve the decedent's interests or the decedent previously indicated must not be disclosed. When under compulsion of a subpoena, the lawyer acts ethically by complying with the subpoena as to any confidential information sought that is not privileged. However, the lawyer should raise the appropriate privilege on behalf of the decedent regarding any confidential information for which there is a good faith basis to raise privilege and request that the court make a determination as to disclosure of the information. This may be particularly true of privileged information that may be embarrassing to the decedent. As above, the lawyer should not make any disclosure of information for which the

lawyer believes in good faith to be privileged has raised privilege in good faith until the court orders disclosure of the information. If the court finds that the information is not privileged or that an exception to privilege applies, the lawyer may either comply with the order by disclosing the information or "first exhaust all appellate remedies." See Rule 4-1.6(d) and Florida Ethics Opinions 65-7, 70-40, and 71-29.

 Doubts about whether information should be voluntarily disclosed should be resolved in favor of nondisclosure.

COMMENT ON AMENDMENTS TO FLA. PROB. RULE 5.260

(CAVEATS: PROCEEDINGS)

The Real Property, Probate and Trust Law Section of The Florida Bar

(hereinafter the "Section") submits this Comment on the amendment to Fla. Prob.

Rule 5.260 (Caveats: Proceedings) adopted by the Court in its December 9, 2010,

opinion and respectfully requests that the Court consider the following suggestions

with respect to that amendment.

I. <u>INTRODUCTION</u>

The Probate Rules Committee of The Florida Bar (hereinafter the "Probate

Rules Committee") filed an out-of-cycle, fast-track report of proposed amendments

to the Florida Probate Rules in response to statutory changes made by chapter

2010-132, Laws of Florida, which became effective on October 1, 2010. The

Court adopted all the proposals of the Probate Rules Committee with the exception

of the proposed amendment to subdivision (b) of Fla. Prob. Rule 5.260 (hereinafter

the "Rule"), which specifies the required contents of a caveat. The Probate Rules

Committee proposed that the Rule be amended to provide as follows:

(b) Contents. The caveat shall <u>must</u> contain the decedent's name, <u>the last four digits of</u> the decedent's social security number or date of birth, if known, a statement of the interest of the caveator in the estate, and the name, specific mailing address, and residence address of the caveator.

The Court, however, amended the Rule to delete the requirement that caveats contain the decedent's social security number or date of birth, if known, and a statement of the interest of the caveator in the estate, as follows:

(b) Contents. The caveat shall contain the decedent's name, the decedent's social security number, or date of birth, if known, a statement of the interest of the caveator in the estate, and the name, and specific mailing address, and residence address of the caveator.

In support of its deletion of the former Rule's requirement that the decedent's identifying information, if known, and a statement of the caveator's interest in the estate, be included in the caveat, the Court noted that the statutory changes made by chapter 2010-132, section 3, Laws of Florida (which were proposed and supported by the Section), deleted the requirement for that information to be included in the caveat. However, the reason that the Section and its Probate Law and Procedure Committee (hereinafter the "Probate Law Committee") proposed deleting the required contents of a caveat from the statute was to expunge procedure (which should properly be included in the probate rules) from the statutes. The Section and the Probate Law Committee felt the content of a caveat, particularly the identifying information, was more procedural than substantive and was already properly specified in the Rule.

II. BACKGROUND AND OVERVIEW OF RELEVANT LAW

A caveat is a written notice which can be filed with the probate court to prevent administration of estates without notice to the caveator. §731.110, Fla. Stat. If a caveat is filed by an interested person, other than a creditor, the court may not admit the will to probate or appoint a personal representative until formal notice is served upon the caveator. §731.110(3), Fla. Stat. The statute was recently amended to clarify that interested persons, other than creditors, may file caveats either before or after the death of the person for whom the estate will be, or is being, administered. The caveat of a creditor may only be filed after the person's death. §731.110(1), Fla. Stat. To ease the burden on the courts and clerks, the statutory amendment does provide that pre-death caveats expire 2 years after filing. The amendment also removes procedural aspects that were improperly contained in the statute and, in some respects, conflicted with the procedure contained in the Rule, thereby causing confusion among practitioners.

Article V, § 2(a) of the Florida Constitution vests in the Supreme Court the power to adopt rules for the practice and procedure in all courts. The legislature has the power to repeal a rule adopted by the Supreme Court by a two-thirds vote, but it has no constitutional authority to enact any law relating to practice and procedure. *In re Clarification of Florida Rules of Practice and Procedure (Florida Constitution, Article V, Section 2(a))*, 281 So.2d 204 (Fla. 1973). Any statute or

portion thereof which creates a procedure rather than a substantive right is constitutionally infirm because it infringes on the rule making power of the Supreme Court. *Johnson v. State*, 308 So.2d 127 (Fla. 1st DCA 1975); *Milton v. Leapai*, 562 So.2d 804 (Fla. 5th DCA 1990). Further, the enactment of laws by the legislature which contain practice and procedure creates confusion in the judicial branch when such laws are in conflict with or supplemental to various rules of practice or procedure enacted by the Supreme Court. *In re Clarification of Florida Rules of Practice and Procedure (Florida Constitution, Article V, Section 2(a)), supra.*

The Probate Rules Committee has diligently labored to purge substance from the rules and the 1988 amendments to the Probate Rules, *In Re Rules of Probate and Guardianship Procedure*, 531 So.2d 1261 (Fla. 1988), were the first organized step toward that goal. Although that labor was concluded, a substantial measure of procedure remained lodged in the statutes. Rule 5.010 Scope, was changed in 1988 to include (and still includes) a Committee Note which addressed this matter and provided *inter alia*:

The committee, through the proper channels in The Florida Bar (initially, the Probate Law Committee of the Real Property, Probate and Trust Law Section), intends to ask the legislature to repeal those portions of the statutes that are procedural when there are similar rules already in place, or when similar new rules are added by this opinion. It is the opinion of the committee that continuing to maintain procedure in the statutes when there is a rule specifying that procedure

is detrimental to the orderly process of the court and the public that it serves, especially when, over time, the statute and the rule may diverge. (At page 1263.)

Mindful of that direction, in 2001, the Probate Law Committee undertook a project to purge the statutes of procedure to bolster the constitutionality of the statutes. See chapter 2001-226, Section 81, Laws of Florida. As a result of that project, most of the procedure was removed from the Probate Code. However, as statutes are amended to make substantive changes, the Probate Law Committee continues to review the statutes to assure that no improper procedural aspects (which may result in conflict or confusion with a corresponding probate rule) remain. Further amendments are then proposed to remove the procedural aspects from the statute if there is a corresponding rule properly containing the necessary procedure. In this case, the right to file a caveat is a substantive right or a part of the law which creates, defines, and regulates rights. See Massey v. Davidi, 979 So.2d 931 at 936-937 (Fla. 2008); State of Fla. v. Garcia, 229 So.2d 2136 (Fla. 1969). That right is properly resident in the statute. In contrast, the Probate Law Committee believed that the aspects of the statute governing the contents of the caveat, particularly those concerning the identity of the decedent, fell within the method or order by which a party enforces it substantive rights. See *Massey* at 937. Such procedural aspects are more properly the content of a rule of court rather than a statute. Insofar as those procedural aspects of the statute were already included in subsection (b) of the Rule, they were therefore removed from the statute. The removal of the content requirement from the statute did not signify a decision by the Section or the Probate Law Committee that the personal information regarding the decedent or the caveator was no longer needed. It was simply a part of the continuing effort to assure that the statutes do not contain improper procedural aspects.

III. <u>DISCUSSION REGARDING AMENDMENT TO RULE</u>

Regardless of the reason that the provisions specifying the contents of caveats were removed from Fla. Stat., §731. 110, the Section strongly believes that certain personal information relating to the decedent and to the caveator is vital to the effectiveness of the caveat procedure and should be included in the Rule. As clarified by the recent amendment to Fla. Stat., § 731.110, the time in which a caveat may be filed differs depending on the interest of the caveator. More specifically, a pre-death caveat may only be filed by an interested person other than a creditor. Under the Rule as amended by the Court in its December 9, 2010, opinion, the caveator is no longer required to include a statement identifying his interest in the estate. Without inclusion of that statement in the caveat, it will be impossible to determine from the face of the caveat whether it is one that can be filed pre-death, that is whether it is filed by a creditor or by an interested person other than a creditor. Furthermore, the manner in which the court and other

interested persons are required to respond to a caveat differs dramatically depending upon whether the caveat is filed by a creditor or an interested person other than a creditor. Under the current Rule, the clerk of court and attorneys will be unable to determine from the face of the caveat whether the clerk must simply notify the caveator in writing that Letters of Administration have been issued under subsection (e) of the Rule (required if the caveator is a creditor) or whether, under subsection (f), formal notice must be served upon the caveator by the petitioner before a will can be admitted or a personal representative can be appointed (required where the caveator is an interested person).

Furthermore, additional problems will arise because of the absence of the personal information in the caveat. First, a pre-death caveat expires two years from the date of filing. If the caveat is not renewed, no further action will need to be taken by an estate or the clerk. A post-death caveat, however, never expires. If a creditor's caveat (provided it is possible to determine from the caveat if the caveator is a creditor) is filed post-death for a John Jones in Miami, the clerk will be required to serve written notice upon that caveator every time an estate is petitioned for administration for any John Jones whose date of death is prior to the date the caveat was filed. The inclusion of personal information of the decedent, such as the last four digits of the social security number and the year of the date of birth for John Jones, will permit the clerk to determine which John Jones the caveat

was intended to relate to and will eliminate unnecessary repeated service of notices. Next, if a caveat is filed by an interested person other than a creditor of John Jones, no estate for any John Jones who died before (or within 2 years after) the date the caveat was filed, can be opened until formal notice is served upon the caveator. Formal notice is not complete until the notice is received by the caveator under Fla. Prob. Rule 5.040(a) (4), so if the caveator cannot be located because the caveator's address (perhaps after several years) is no longer current, the estate cannot be opened. The inclusion of personal information regarding the decedent would allow the clerk to identify the John Jones to which the caveat was directed and eliminate the unnecessary service in estates of unintended decedents and the related delay of administration of estates of individuals with common names.

The Section, the Probate Law Committee, and the Probate Rules Committee are aware of the Court's concerns about the filing of unnecessary personal or other sensitive information in court files. In light of those concerns, the Probate Rules Committee proposed changes to subsection (b) of the Rule to include a truncated version of the social security number containing only the last four digits. The Probate Law Committee and the Probate Rules Committee both felt strongly that inclusion of some part of the social security number is necessary for proper identification of the person for whom the estate is or will be administered. In addition, to comply with the proposed amendments to *Fla. R. Jud. Admin. 2.425*,

Minimization of the Filing of Sensitive Information, which are currently pending before the Court, the Section would further propose limiting the information regarding the individual's date of birth to the year of birth. Again, some identifying information is needed; however the detail in the required information can be balanced against the need to limit the filing of sensitive information.

Finally, to account for the fact that a caveat may now be filed prior to the death of an individual by an interested person other than a creditor, the language in subsection (b) of the Rule should be further amended to remove the reference to the "decedent" and replace it with a reference to the "person for whom the estate is or will be administered." This is consistent with changes to subsection (a) of the Rule proposed by the Probate Rules Committee.

IV. CONCLUSION

For the above reasons, the Section respectfully requests the Court to consider these comments and amend subsection (b) of the Rule to include the requirement to specify whether the caveator is a creditor or an interested person other than a creditor, and the requirement to include certain items of personal information about the decedent, while at the same time limiting the filing of sensitive information to that information absolutely necessary for proper identification, to provide as follows:

(b) Contents. The caveat shall contain the decedent's name, of the person for whom the estate is or will be administered, the last four digits of that person's social security number or that person's year of birth, if known, a statement of the interest of the caveator in the estate, and the name and, specific mailing address, and residence address of the caveator.
